THE EDUCATIONAL GOALS OF ASHLAND CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

- 1. To teach that the Bible is the inspired and the only infallible authoritative Word of God, thus developing attitudes of love and respect toward it. (II Timothy 3:15, 16, 17; II Peter 1:20, 21)
- 2. To teach the basic doctrines of the Bible. (Titus 2:1)
- 3. To provide opportunities for the student to confess Christ as Savior and Lord. (Romans 10:9,10)
- 4. To teach the student to know and obey the will of God as revealed in the Scriptures, thus equipping the student to carry out God's will daily. (Romans 12:1, 2,; II Timothy 2:15; Deut. 26:16, 17)
- 5. To impart an understanding of each Christian's place in the body of Christ, and its worldwide mission, providing opportunities for the student's involvement in this task. (Eph. 4:12; I Cor. 12:1-31; Matt. 28:19,20)
- 6. To teach Biblical character qualities and provide opportunities for the student to demonstrate these qualities. (I Sam. 16:7; Gal. 5:22, 23)
- 7. To teach the student how to develop the mind of Christ towards godliness. (Phil 2:5; I Tim. 4:7)
- 8. To encourage the student to develop self-discipline and responsibility from God's perspective. (I Tim. 4:7; I Cor. 9:24-27)
- 9. To teach the student the respect for and submission to authority from God's perspective. (Romans 13:1-7; Heb. 13:17; Eph. 6:1-3)
- 10. To help the student develop a Christian world view by integrating life, and all studies, with the Bible. (II Peter 1:3)
- 11. To teach the student to hide God's Word in his heart through memorization and meditation. (Psalm 119: 11; Psalm 1:1-3)
- 12. To teach the student how to study God's Word. (II Timothy 2:15)
- 13. To help the student develop his self-image as a unique individual created in the image of God and to attain his fullest potential. (Psalm 139:13-16)
- 14. To teach the student to treat everyone with love and respect as unique individuals created in God's image. (Phil 2:1-4; Eph. 5:21)
- 15. To teach the student how to become a contributing member of his society by realizing his need to serve others. (Gal. 5:13; Rom. 12:10)
- 16. To teach the student Biblical skills for personal and social relationships. (Ps 119:9; Eph. 4:12)
- 17. To teach the student the Biblical view of dating, marriage, and the family. (I Thess. 4: 1-7; I Tim. 4: 1-2; Gen. 2 18-25; Eph. 5: 22-23)
- 18. To teach the student that God created all people male and female (Genesis 1:27, 5:2) and that rejecting the gender given to a person by God is a rejection of God's sovereignty. (Romans 1:18-23)

- 19. To teach the student that God has created the institution of marriage to exist as a lifelong relationship between one man and one woman (Genesis 2:24; Matthew 19:5,6).
- 20. To teach the student physical fitness, good health habits, and the wise use of the body as the temple of God. (I Cor. 6:19-20)
- 21. To teach the student biblical attitudes toward material things and his responsibility for using them to God's glory. (I Tim. 6:17-19; Matt 6:19,20; I Cor. 10:31)
- 22. To teach the student an appreciation of the Fine Arts.
- 23. To teach the student to understand and use the fundamental processes in communicating and dealing with others (such as reading, writing, speaking, listening, and mathematics). (II Cor. 5:20)
- 24. To teach and encourage the student to use good study skills and habits. (II Tim. 2:3-7)
- 25. To teach the student how to research and to reason logically from a Biblical perspective. (Heb. 5:14; Rom. 12:2)
- 26. To teach the student creative and critical thinking based upon the proper use of Biblical criteria from evaluation. (II Tim. 3:14-17)
- 27. To teach the student good citizenship through an understanding and appreciation of our Christian and American heritage (home, church, nation). (I Cor. 10:11; Rom. 13:1-7)
- 28. Use current affairs in all areas, teaching the student how they relate to God's plan for man.
- 29. To teach the student an understanding of and an appreciation of God's world, developing an awareness of man's role in his environment and his God-given responsibility to subdue, use and preserve it properly. (Ps. 8:6; Heb. 2:6-8)

AIMS – In working with the homes from which the students come, the school aims:

- 1. To aid families in Christian growth and to help them develop Christ-centered homes. (Eph. 5:22-23; II Peter 3:18)
- 2. To cooperate closely as servants to the parents in every phase of the student's development, especially as it relates to the school program. (Mark 10:45)
- 3. To help the parents to understand the school's purpose and program.
- 4. To assist parents in keeping up with the changing culture and its effect on the home and the implications for their children.
- 5. To encourage regular attendance and involvement in the local church. (Heb. 10: 24-25)
- 6. To encourage parents to realize and shoulder the responsibility for the spiritual, moral and social education of their children. (Deut. 6:4-7; Prov. 22:6)
- 7. To teach the students that it is God's desire that, if a young woman marries, she should love and respect her husband as the spiritual leader of their home. She should nurture their children and manage their home. (I Tim. 5:14; Titus 2:4-5; Prov. 31; Eph. 5:22-23)
- 8. To teach the students that it is God's desire that, if a young man marries, he is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He is the primary spiritual leader and provider of his home. (Eph. 5:22-23; I Tim. 5:8)
